He had quite a set of pipes and could be considered our first 'neighborhood watcher' calling out when alarmed by a sound. While out walking I could hear him clear across to the other side of the neighborhood and it always made me smile thinking of him 'on duty'. We were less likely to smile when he stood outside our bedroom window and practiced honking early in the summer mornings.

Now the great pine tree is void of his silhouette at night. Our yard is colorless without him. Spring will be silent without his calls. His passing is terribly sad but we are grateful for having known this friendly peacock.

CITIZENS ADVISORY PANEL

As explained in the September newsletter, Chief of Police Mike Skogh invited seven Gardena residents including me to participate in the newly formed Chief of Police Citizen Advisory Panel (COPCAP). This panel will not review complaints or be a watchdog of police activity. We will work with residents, the GPD, businesses and associations to fight crime and the factors that cause it. This is the basis of Community Oriented Policing. Our goal is to improve the quality of life in Gardena by making it a better, safer place to live.

BACK TO BASICS

You've left the house with a window open before to run a quick errand and everything was okay, so it should be okay this time too. Right? Wrong! Criminals are constant opportunists and prefer easy access into your home. Your open window will help them tremendously.

Having Neighborhood Watch signs on our streets and in our windows is not enough to keep criminals out. You must secure your home and report suspicious activity or sounds to the police.

What should you do if you return home and suspect someone has entered your home:

- DO NOT enter your home! The criminal may still be there and could hurt you
- Go to a neighbor's house and use their phone to call the police
- Keep an eye on the house at all times in case someone comes out so you can take a description of the person
- Let the police investigate the situation. They are the professionals in these matters.

HEROES AMONG US

Before September 11, there probably was little thought of heroes. Since that day we have heroes who have given their lives, their blood, and their money to help others. We are grateful to these people.


