HOLIDAY BACK TO BASICS

- Holidays can be fun, exhausting, and dangerous. Fun because there are parties to go to or host, there's
 decorating to be done, and many details out of the ordinary to attend to like traveling. These may be the
 same reasons why we feel exhausted!
- Holidays can also be dangerous because criminals will be watching for when your guard is down, your house is empty, or your car is full of packages. To avoid being a victim of crime:
- Be organized. Be alert. Fumbling in your purse for your keys or checkbook, being overwhelmed with packages and jackets you are carrying, or chatting away on a cell phone cause you to lose awareness of your surroundings. This makes you an easy target for criminals.
- Be watchful for suspicious persons in parking lots and parking structures. Be alert to individuals who follow you and/or watch you place items in your car. Report all suspicious activity to security.
- Lock packages, briefcases, and other valuables out of view in the trunk of your car. Close all windows professional thieves have tools that help unlock cars through a minimum of open space.
- Close and lock ALL windows and doors when you leave the house. (Yes, even the bathroom window)
- Look at your house at night and see all the lights you have on. Purchase enough timers to recreate that look when you are away so it looks like the home is occupied.
- Take your mail to the post office for mailing and don't let delivered mail sit around in your mailbox.
 Criminals will take envelopes hoping to find cash, checks and credit card information.
- Stop delivery of your newspaper before going away. Uncollected newspapers indicate no one is home.
 Criminals attracted to these homes may also try to break into other houses while they are in the area.
- Make the neighborhood safer and pick up newspapers & advertisements you see piling up. If YOUR newspapers are piling up and you are home, pick them up!
- o Newspaper circulation departments can be made aware of the important role they play in our crime fighting

efforts by not delivering newspapers when the subscription is suspended. Call the newspaper if there is a problem.
